### Population Growth Returns After 60 Years

In 2024, in-migration exceeded outmigration, boosting Kitakyushu's net population by 492 residents as the city's industrial initiatives pay off.

#### 589 Companies, ¥1 Trillion Invested

In the past two years, 93 companies have invested ¥388.6 billion, with digital and manufacturing industries transforming Kitakyushu and attracting people and growth.

#### 3,000 STEM Graduates Every Year

Kitakyushu, with abundant water, reliable power, and excellent transport infrastructure, produces 3,000 STEM graduates and around 9,000 graduates overall each year.
